Made to Measure

BFFS Scotland wants to find out just how huge the film society audience in Scotland is. We know we have shed loads of film societies North of the Border and that you all have lots of enthusiastic members but we have never formally measured the size of that audience.

Then when Filmbank changed the terms of their commercial license last year they added a requirement that you complete a Commercial Returns License for each film hired which includes several questions about the number, type and price of tickets sold.

So we at BFFS Scotland are asking that when you submit your Commercial Returns License to Filmbank you also copy us in. We hope that this information will allow us to prove the incredible impact that film societies in Scotland have and how crucial a part of the exhibition network they are.

This will be of particular interest to funders, partner organizations and various other bodies who support community cinema in Scotland.

Autumn Event 2007

The Spring Event held at Glasgow Film Theatre Hall on Sunday 6th May was, as always, a great opportunity to see some fantastic films and catch up with friends from film societies across Scotland.

The current committee for BFFS Scotland was re-elected at the AGM after the morning screenings. Both at the AGM and during the workshop in the afternoon, all were able to contribute to a stimulating discussion of your needs as film societies and community cinemas in a changing environment. We were pleased to be joined by Jennifer Armitage from Scottish Screen who will, with her colleagues, be feeding your ideas back to the ongoing discussions about Creative Scotland, the organization that will succeed Scottish Screen (and the other arts bodies in Scotland) in the near future. We were lucky to have Stolen, another great film from DocSpace which was very well received. In fact, nearly all of the films received excellent audience ratings. Only the Oscar nominated Half Nelson received a luke-warm reaction

Life in the DVD Afterlife: Incident at Loch Ness

Bizarrely ignored by UK distributors 2004's excellent Incident at Loch Ness has been something you can only see at rare festival or special screenings. Now on Region 1 DVD you can see this fantastically funny and gently cynical mockumentary about a filmmaker's search for the Loch Ness monster. Successful screenwriter Zak Penn's low budget directorial debut is an absolute delight full of quirky cameos and beautifully silly playing from Herzog. Laughs are a plenty, Scotland retains it's dignity and Nessie is of course a star. Fabulous!

"When I was young, the film societies at colleges were really first-run art houses. That almost was the only place you could see movies, especially outside of New York or L.A. I used to tour them all the time with Divine – that's how this started, by doing campus appearances that would sometimes almost be riots when Divine would come out. 

1) Name: Joan MacPherson

3) I first got involved in film societies/community cinemas when...



4) My official role in Strathendrick Film Society is...

Media secretary but I have more fun just as a committee member and love it when we have ideas that give us and the members a bit of a laugh.

5) When I'm not watching films I can mostly be found...

On the internet e-baying, buying dvd's of world cinema or researching outings and holidays for the Third Age Group Strathendrick (www.tagstrathendrick.org) for which I'm secretary I write a local news column for the Milngavie and Bearsden Herald and pass it to the local free sheets and other local papers. I am on the Central Scotland Co-op committee and have the pleasure of helping distribute money through their community dividend and work with them promoting fair trade and co-operative principles.

6) Most unique screening experience?

Was right after a film, listening to a traumatised friend tell how the short film 'The Long Span' had a devastating effect on her, it reminded her of the day her life was ruined. Her father was involved with constructing the Forth Roadbridge, and when the Queen came to open it, his family were invited to the event. Her school teacher had an obsession about her class always winning the Best Attendance Prize every year. Because, with permission from the headmistress, my friend was off school that one day, another teacher's class won the best attendance prize that year. From that day on my friend's teacher hated her. My friend was so stressed at school she could not concentrate in class. She went from almost top to nearly bottom of the class. Her parents and five elder brothers and sisters told her she was stupid. She could not explain why she was having problems. Her parents were ashamed that she did not pass the 11+ and was the first in the family not to get into high school, and her future, as things were then, was sealed. A dissapointment to her parents she never got to feel that anyone was proud of her. Now in her 50's she has worked at night school, gained several qualifications but most importantly, she is a foster parent instilling confidence in youngsters who have had a hard time. Of course this could just be a draft for a film!!

7) What was the first film you remember seeing?

Old Yeller in the Odeon Motherwell, I cried my eyes out. I had seen films before this but cannot remember the events. I often went to the pictures with Margaret Mooney a family friend who took me out a lot. I remember I was allowed to close my eyes and bury my face on her lap if I was frightened or did not want to see the sad bits of any film.

8) And the most recent?

'Open Hearts' last night. Another e-bay find.

9) The best thing about my film society is...

Enjoying a film in company, others laughing at the same time and members saying I'm so glad I came tonight, I would never have gone to see that if it had not been on here. Tea and coffee afterwards gives members a chance to mix, blether and give feedback to the committee. . . that can also lead to

The housing and preservation of Scottish Screen's extensive collection of films made in and about Scotland recently moved to the National Library of Scotland but the Archive section of the Scottish Screen website, which is also the catalogue for the access collection, remains a fantastic resource. The site houses over 300 film clips from a weird and wonderful selection that covers all aspects of Scottish life. Most films are available to hire from the Archive for non-commercial screenings so if you're looking for a quirky addition to your programme or a locally relevant short to compliment one of your main features this is an excellent place to look.

Cultural Hubs in Creative Scotland

Scottish Screen, who provide significant financial support for BFFS Scotland, are currently undergoing structural change and will shortly be combining with the Scottish Arts Council to form a single Scottish arts body to be known as Creative Scotland. All of the current activities of Scottish Screen will be taken over by this new body and activities are underway at the moment to find the most efficient way in which to take this forward. Although this will not have any immediatte effect on BFFS Scotland or any film societies, community cinemas and community arts organisations, there will be a long term effect on the way in which services, support and funding may be rolled out.

Anne Bonar has just been appointed as the Transition Director for Creative Scotland and Scottish Screen are continuing to undertake regular Open Meetings to discuss the future of the organisation with interested organisations and individuals (see Sidebar for details of the November dates). Scottish Screen and related cinema and arts organisations across Scotland are also discussing plans for proposed "Cultural Hubs". The idea of which woulis to separate various aspects of the screen industries in Scotland into thematic and/or geographic Hubs which would condense expertise so that anyone wanting to receive advice, support, funding or communication with similar organisations and/or individuals could do so through the relavent Hub. There may, for example, be Hubs for production, community cinema, festivals or for geographic areas such as the Highlands & Islands although at the August 2007 presentations Scottish Screen was expecting that at the end of the process approximately 6 Hubs would be formed.

The exact type and locations of Hubs are still very much under discussion but it is likely that BFFS Scotland will be involved in at least one of the Hubs and will most likely work with whichever Hub becomes the focus for community and rural cinema exhibition to continue our commitment to supporting community cinema in Scotland. Once more is known about the Hubs and BFFS Scotland's role we will of course let you know but for now we wanted to bring both the formation of Creative Scotland and the emerging Hubs to your attention. Both elements of the restructing of the arts in Scotland are likely to start becoming





more visible in the next 12-18 months and at this point the Hubs may have a more direct impact on your film society, community cinema or local arts group as there may be increased access to expertise and funding for special projects, new ongoing activities and the building of new relationship with relavent partner organisations who may also work with your local or most relavent Hub.

So, as Scottish Screen take stock now is also the perfect time for your organisation to think about what you are doing with your film society or community cinema at the moment and how you would like to extend or change that in the coming 2 to 5 years so that you can provide an even better service to your members, ticket buyers and local com-munity. BFFS Scotland would be very interested to hear and support any such ideas you may have as part of our own planning for the next few years which will be very different but hold a great deal of exciting opportunities for us all.

Scottish Screen Open **Meetings - November 2007**

BFFS National News

BFFS has recently published the results of comprehensive survey of film societies and community cinema. The survey carried out by Jim Barratt the BFFS Advice and Support consultant, provides a key update on a sector of significant cultural importance to the UK - that of not-for-profit community cinema. Rural Cinema North Report

In 2005, responding to the Rural Cinema Development Scheme set up by Scottish Screen, Inverness-based arts agency HI~Arts linked up with Eden Court Theatre, and North East Arts Touring to establish the Rural Cinema North project, for a pilot period of two years. The aim was to promote Cinema as an art form across Argyll, the Highlands and Islands, and the North East, making a wider range of films accessible to rural communities.The challenge was to seek out those who wished to screen films in their community, but who lacked the specific experience or support to do so. The RCN project, then, was most successful as an enabler, rather than instigator, of local community film activity such as:

VirtualFilmClub.org.uk - A permanent information resource for anyone wishing to set up DVD screenings in their community, the website launched early in 2006 and was still receiving between 5-10 enquiries per month 18 months later. These ranged from community groups in the project area requesting further advice or assistance, to overseas programmers and academics researching Scottish films. One recent enquiry came from a group in Trinidad and Tobago!

Mull Film Club - one of several societies nurtured by RCN; An Tobar Arts Centre in Tobermory wished to host a film club, but did not have time to run it directly. With the help of BFFS Scotland (whose support was invaluable throughout the two year pilot) I set up a 'taster' screening and spoke to individuals wishing to be involved in running regular screenings. BFFS Scotland lent equipment longer term, whilst I continued to offer advice by email, and made the initial film bookings on the society's behalf.

Nairn Arts Festival - RCN booked 6 silent 16mm Charlie Chaplin films for a special screening with live piano accompaniment. RCN found prints, projectionists and equipment for several similar one-off events, such as Cowalfest, Cinema China in the Highlands, This Time This Place (Resolis Community Arts) and Fort William Mountain Film Festival.

Fraserburgh Junior Arts Society - FJAS wished to launch their projection equipment, paid for by a long-term fundraising campaign. The Scottish Screen lottery-funded short film Born to Run had recently been shot in the town, and the director wished to screen it to cast, crew and families. RCN programmed an evening of locally made community work, stretching back over 15 years and culminating in the premiere of the new film.

Though my work with Rural Cinema North has now come to a close, plans are being drawn together for a national rural support network. I hope that in future community groups in non-urban areas across the whole of Scotland will benefit from the work of this pilot project.
